## Summary from CatSIG Education discussion forum 19 August 2025

## General notes on education, training and professional development

- Emphasis on the right blend of theory and practical in study theory for the foundational understanding, but courses need to have a strong practical component.
- Working through practical examples is a great way to learn, when complemented by learning the "why", and feedback and discussion.
- On the job training is relied on a lot. "How we do it here" can be problematic however a broader understanding of cataloguing is important.
- Finding the time to work through online training sessions for sole cataloguers

#### New Zealand-based cataloguing paper

- Strong agreement that this is very necessary for both vendors and library based cataloguers.
- Needs to be accessible:
- o When is it run? (e.g. not necessarily needed yearly; regularly rather than frequently)
- o Prerequisite papers? (Prerequisites and the need for existing library experience could be a barrier)
- o Can someone do a single paper? (i.e. not commit to a full certificate/diploma/degree in order to do the paper)
- o Cost
- o Content needs to be considered carefully to ensure that there is not a large number of people who complete the paper expecting roles
- o Focus of content of course needs to be looked at carefully

## Job security and the changing reality of cataloguing roles

- Fewer positions available, and positions increasingly have cataloguing being a component part rather than the main part of a job.
- Not have enough knowledge to understand how bibliographic information affect findability in the catalogue.
- Getting younger people into the profession is important.
- How to get vendor-library relationships working well is increasingly important how do libraries retain the necessary cataloguing knowledge when outsourcing so that they can communicate their needs effectively with their vendors (and how do they retain this knowledge)? And also keep up with changing standards etc.?

#### Sessions that CatSIG could do

- Ad-hoc, short sessions on very specific subjects (e.g. how best to deal with reprints) these wouldn't need to be very long.
- Session on data cleanup when to do it, when to leave things alone, how best to go about it etc.

#### Places to ask questions and discuss cataloguing

- The CatSIG Listserv although these can be a bit unreliable depending on your institution setup (firewalls etc.) and Microsoft Office quarantine function
- Basecamp, Teams?
- If a forum for conversation was hosted somewhere that "place" would need to be stable: who would host?
- o LIANZA is looking at platforms for all LIANZA communities/groups get in touch if you have any ideas.

# Oceania RDA Committee (ORDAC) update

#### RDA Steering Committee meetings

As the CatSIG representative on ORDAC, I have been supporting Charlotte Christiansen in her role as Oceania representative to the RDA Steering Committee (RSC) in preparing for meetings by reading and providing feedback on discussion papers and proposals.

There have been two RSC meetings since the last issue of Catapult. Two new Advisory Working Groups are being set up, with members being sought; the Music Working Group and the Archives Working Group. If one (or both!) of these is your area of expertise and you're interested, then please let me know!

The RDA regional committee/group for Latin America and the Caribbean (RDA-ALyC) has been formed, and a representative from the region attended the July RSC meeting for the first time, which is exciting news for internationalisation. You can read more about this on the RDA Toolkit website.

Progress is being made on soft-deprecated elements (original RDA elements that are not recommended for use in official RDA and are slated for eventual full deprecation (removal)). Proposal and discussion papers regarding these elements will be presented at the November RSC meeting.

The November RSC meeting promises to be a full and busy one, potentially with two public sessions instead of the usual one. If you are interested in listening in on a public session, then let me know (daylight savings will mean the start time is not too punishing!).

The great (but very orderly and slightly hushed - because we are librarians after all) subfield \$v debate

The Library of Congress <u>announced in</u>
<u>January 2025</u> that as part of a Linked Datafriendly "Modern MARC" cataloguing
practice, they will no longer include form/
genre subdivisions (e.g., 600 \$v, 650 \$v, 651
\$v) in subject headings.

To convey form and genre, the Library of Congress will instead use only LCGFT genre/form terms in separate fields (MARC field 655).

Deborah Tomaras read the announcement, and rather than mentally shrugging and muttering about what a terrible idea this is (which was my initial response), pulled together a working group to advocate for retaining the subfield.

The American Library Association Subject Analysis Committee Working Group on \$v Retention (sorry about the long name) came together to share potential impacts of the changes on library collections, catalogues, staff, and patrons and to work to lobby to retain the subfield v subject headings. The working group sees several potential

problems with the subfield \$v removal - for the end-user, the library catalogue, and the staff. A smattering of these include:

- Patron searching may be impeded, since subjects with \$v have different usage than genre fields.
  - For example, finding books across all fiction genres that feature characters with depression would be possible only using a subject with \$v, such as "Depressed persons \$v Fiction". With the change, the subject would just appear as "Depressed persons," intermingling fiction and nonfiction (and movies, comics, etc.) into a much larger search result set.
- Patrons may lose an easy visual differentiation between juvenile and adult materials when searching. This is particularly problematic since LCGFT doesn't allow audience-related terms (so there isn't a "Children's fiction" genre equivalent to use instead).

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#### Cont.

- Patrons may lose an easy way to locate topics in different media or differentiate between fiction and nonfiction.
  - ⇒ For example, Patrons wouldn't be able to search on strings like "Zombies \$v Fiction" versus "Zombies \$v Drama" versus "Zombies \$v Comic books, strips, etc." to find their desired media (the subject would just appear as "Zombies").
- Form subdivisions provide one of the best ways to describe specific, complex facets of archival collections and other specialty materials. So \$v removal might specifically hinder archival and special collections searches (removing such qualifying \$v terms as \$v Early works to 1800, \$v Archives, \$v Records and correspondence, \$v Specimens, etc.)
- Many library catalogues lack direct genre/form search capability, even in the advanced search menu. This would mean that removing \$v from subjects, and relying only on genres, would make formerly visible weeding, creating LibGuides, etc.)

information unfindable and unusable for patrons.

- Form subdivisions (\$v) in subjects do not always have one-to-one genre replacements that cataloguers can use.
- Current LCGFT is not robust enough to sufficiently replace all instances of \$v that cataloguers might want to use.
- Many libraries don't have the resources, expertise or time to add back missing necessary metadata on a large scale or configure their catalogues to search and display alternate fields.
- Missing \$v and less discoverability might affect circulation stats, particularly for collection materials that rely heavily on \$v for discoverability (fiction, comics, movies, TV shows, poetry, guidebooks, case studies, catalogues, etc.)
- Missing \$v might make it harder to do collection development (locating case studies, textbooks, reports, etc. for faculty purchases, assessing types of materials for

- Not all libraries are planning to transition to linked data. For these libraries, robust MARC records are still a necessity (i.e., the transition to linked data shouldn't force insufficiently descriptive metadata on libraries who can't or won't shift).
- Catalog records created before the advent of genre/form term vocabularies (GSAFD, LCGFT, etc.) often use just \$v subdivisions. It is not always possible to locate and retroactively assign genre/form terms to these comprehensively. This would make older materials inaccessible (for example, older exhibition catalogues in art libraries).

The list is clearly far from exhaustive (and we are sure you can think of more possible issues that are specific to your library).

Now, if you managed to read all of this and stay awake, and you have some thoughts you want to share. Perhaps you are yearning to talk to other folk who are passionate about subfields, or you just want me to not be the lone New Zealander in the working group. Good news, anyone is welcome to join. It is currently mostly libraries in the U.S. (with a sprinkling of Canadians)
